GRANTS UPDATE

The Grants Branch webpage has recently undergone a host of updates and revisions. A number of new and useful training videos and tools have been updated to better assist you in your endeavor to successfully obtain and manage grant awards and to seek reimbursement of grant expenditures. Keep in mind, these are just aids in the process and are not meant to be definitive in compliance of grant requirements.

A [Grants Training Page](#) has been added, which contains training in a variety of areas including how to use systems such as EGMS and the BSIR and how to navigate a variety of topics including payroll expenses, contracts, equipment, reporting requirements, and procurement. If you have any comments or suggestions on further training please contact your grants specialist.

Also, a few templates and guides have been added to the [Grants Toolkit](#). The Master Asset Listing and Annual Inventory templates have been updated and, as a reminder, are due no later than January 31 each year. Examples of an Asset Transfer Form and Equipment Disposition Form have been added as an example to use in whole or part to describe the requirements involved with moving or disposing of equipment. The procurement guide and checklist have been updated to account for raising the procurement threshold, however, if your county policy is more stringent don't forget that you will still have to abide by that policy as well. Lastly, the monitoring section has compiled a list of the most common monitoring visit recommendations that we hope can help you double check any compliance issues you may have.

Virtual Tabletop Exercise Program

Purpose: Provide the Fiscal Year (FY) 2019 planned broadcast dates for Virtual Tabletop Exercises (VTTX) in support of the 2018-2019 seven Principal’s Objectives

Participation Requirements: The VTTX will be limited to approximately 10-15 locations per exercise. Participants must have an appropriate site equipped with VTC capability (not web-based) that can access the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) VTC site (connection information will be provided by EMI). Participating locations will be responsible for local exercise logistics, and should designate an exercise coordinator to implement the logistical requirements for the exercise. In addition, the location must provide a person capable of facilitating the on-site portion of exercise. Electronic copies of the related exercise materials (Situation Manual) will be provided in advance by EMI.

To Apply: Locations interested in participating in the VTTX series should submit an email request to participate in the exercise to Douglas Kahn at douglas.kahn@fema.dhs.gov, phone (301) 447-7645, with preferred date of participation. Your email is your program application. When applying, please provide a central point of contact from your organization to work all VTTX issues. Each location will receive a notice from EMI and will be provided with relevant logistical information and exercise materials to set up and facilitate the exercise locally. The FEMA Form 119-25-2 is not required to be submitted until the VTTX is completed. 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OHIO EMA HIGHLIGHTED TRAINING

G548 Continuity Program Manager, January 15 – 17, 2017 at Portage County EMA

This course is designed to acquaint experienced Continuity of Operations (COOP) practitioners and instructors with the COOP Program Managers Course materials. The course will also refresh experienced instructors on instructional methodology and techniques. **Course Objectives:** Define Continuity of Operations, Explain the benefits of developing a viable continuity program, Identify the elements of a viable continuity program, Identify the processes, resources, and tasks necessary to implement and manage a successful continuity program.

OH202 Debris Management Workshop, May 15, 2019 at Ohio EMA

This course provides an overview of issues and recommended actions necessary to plan for, respond to, and recover from a major debris-generating event with emphasis on state and local responsibilities. Developed from a pre-disaster planning perspective, the course includes debris staff organizations; compliance with laws and regulations; contracting procedures; debris management site selection; volume-reduction methods; recycling; special debris situations; and supplementary assistance. This workshop is for local officials and state personnel who are responsible for planning and/or implementing debris removal and disposal actions. This includes Public Works, Solid Waste Management, Engineering, Environmental Compliance, Public Information, Legal Affairs and Procurement/Contracting personnel.

OH230 Introduction to Emergency Management in Ohio, February 11 – 14, 2019 at Ohio EMA

This 3 ½ -day course provides new emergency managers and staff with the knowledge, skills and tools needed to develop an effective emergency management program in the state of Ohio. The course provides information on basic emergency management concepts and functions and how they're applied in Ohio. It includes modules on mitigation, preparedness, response, recovery, laws and authorities, and funding and grants.

Understanding the fundamental principles and practices of emergency management provides a framework for the future professional growth of every emergency manager and responder. This course is designed to provide a basic framework and understanding of emergency management and homeland security in Ohio.

PER-229 Introduction to CAMEO Suite, December 11 – 13, 2018, Allen County EMA

This course provides training on the fundamental elements of the CAMEO suite of programs as they relate to emergency situations. As such, it includes detailed technical information and hands-on practice of critical elements in the CAMEO system and its associated programs (CAMEO Chemicals, CAMEOfm, ALOHA and MARPLOT). To understand how the programs interface, the course provides participants opportunities to practice key procedures that allow users to enhance planning and response activities associated with community risks. These exercises clarify the connections between the programs and how they can enhance emergency planning and response activities.

L962 Planning Section Chief, January 29 – February 1, 2019 at Franklin County EMA

This course design provides local and state-level emergency responders with a robust understanding of the duties, responsibilities, and capabilities of an effective Planning Section Chief (PSC) on an All-Hazards Incident Management Team. These responsibilities fall into two categories: PSC duties 1) managing the planning cycle and 2) tracking resources and incident status. Exercises, simulations, discussions and a final exam enable students to apply their new knowledge.

L973 Finance/Admin Section Chief Course, March 19 – 21, 2019 at Tuscarawas County EMA

This four-day course provides local and state-level emergency responders with a robust understanding of the duties, responsibilities, and capabilities of an effective Finance/Administration Section Chief on an All-Hazards Incident Management Team (AHIMT). These responsibilities include managing the Finance/Administration Section personnel and managing the finances and administrative responsibilities during an incident.



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MGT-323 Instructor Development Workshop, March 19 – 21, 2019 at Franklin County EMA

This course primarily serves to give instructors, most of whom already have years of instructional experience within their own organizations, insight into adult education principles as well as the opportunity to comment on and improve their instructional style. The course focuses on enhancing instructional skills that participants may apply within DHS-certified courses, but it also discusses organization-specific policies, procedures and practices. The goal of this course is to ensure instructional excellence by providing a forum for experienced instructors to share their experiences with participants and learn together, both during discussions of instructional techniques and in commenting on each other's presentation skills during prepared teach-backs.

L958 NIMS ICS All-Hazards Operations Section Chief, May 7 – 10, 2019 at Franklin County EMA

FEMA designed this course to provide local and state-level emergency responders with a robust understanding of the duties, responsibilities and capabilities of an effective OSC on an All-Hazards Incident Management Team. These responsibilities fall into two categories: 1) responding to the incident and the command needs of the incident, and 2) effectively fulfilling the position responsibilities of an Operations Section Chief on an All-Hazards ICS Incident Management Team. Exercises, simulations, discussions and a final exam enable students to process and apply their new knowledge.

MGT906-Incident Command System (ICS) TtT (L-449), May 14 – 17, 2019 at Franklin County EMA

This 32-hour, four-day course expands and improves students' ability to deliver Emergency Management Institute's (EMI) Incident Command System (ICS) curricula. This course provides students training on the delivery of ICS-100 Introduction to the ICS; ICS-200 ICS for Single Resource and Initial Action Incidents, ICS-300 Intermediate ICS for Expanding Incidents; ICS-400 Advanced ICS for Command and General Staff—Complex Incidents; ICS-402 ICS Overview for Executives and Senior Officials; and G-191 Emergency Operations Center/ICS Interface courses.

L110 Emergency Management Basic Academy (TtT), May 20 – 24, 2019 at Ohio EMA

This is the train-the-trainer course for those that have at least five years of employment experience in emergency management as a practitioner, meet other pertinent criteria and want to become a certified basic academy instructor. FEMA recognizes the need to tie training programs to an established set of emergency management competencies and to a career development program through a progressive training and education system that includes the foundational-level basic academy. The basic academy provides a structured and progressive framework for acquiring the knowledge, skills and abilities to meet the challenges of an ever-changing emergency management environment.

L101 Foundations of EM, September 16 - 20, 2019 (Week 1) & October 21 – 25, 2019 (Week 2) at Ohio EMA

FEMA recognizes the need to tie training programs to an established set of emergency management competencies and to a Career Development Program through a progressive training and education system that includes the entry-level academy, called the National Emergency Management Basic Academy. Training objectives for this course are based on the newly established emergency manager competencies that the National Emergency Management Association.

L964 Situation Unit Leader, September 30 – October 4, 2019, Tuscarawas County EMA

This course helps emergency management and response personnel establish the essential core competencies required for performing the duties of the Situation Unit Leader (SITL) in an all-hazards incident. This course addresses all responsibilities appropriate to an SITL operating in a local- or state-level All-Hazards Incident Management Team (AHIMT). These responsibilities include processing information, intelligence, and developing displays. The course is an instructor-led training that supports learning through discussion, lecture and active participation in multiple exercises. By requiring participants to bring a SITL kit to the instruction, the course provides a realistic, hands-on approach to mastering the skills of an SITL.



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L102 Science of Disaster, March 16 – 18, 2020 at Ohio EMA

This course provides the participants with an overview of scientific principles and concepts that shape our increasingly dangerous world. The contents of the course include the following: Introduction to Science of Disaster provides a definition and benefits of science. Earth Science describes how the Earth's design sets the stage for the world's natural hazards including earthquakes, volcanic eruptions, tsunamis, and landslides/sinkholes. Climatology describes the scientific basis of common atmospheric hazards including convective storms, tropical cyclones and other hazardous weather. Chemical and biological basics identifies the scientific basis of chemical and biological threats. Explosive, radiological, and nuclear fundamentals identifies the scientific basis of those threats.

L103 Planning: Emergency Operations, March 19 – 20, 2020 at Ohio EMA

FEMA designed this course to give basic concepts and planning steps to those new to the field of emergency management so that they may apply planning discipline and skills to challenges in their jobs. The course content includes Emergency Management Planning doctrine and steps to take to accomplish writing plans and using them to deal with special events, which are common challenges for all jurisdictions.

L146 Homeland Security Exercise & Evaluation Program, June 15 – 16, 2020 at Ohio EMA

FEMA designed this two-day course to introduce participants to the fundamentals of exercise design. Emergency managers, emergency services personnel and individuals who are part of the emergency preparedness communities at all levels of government, private sector or volunteer organizations need to be able to use the fundamentals of exercise simulation and design as an integrated system of resources and capabilities. They designed this course to develop exercising skills in the following areas: Components of the Homeland Security Exercise and Evaluation Program (HSEEP) and the exercise process application. Also, comprehensive exercise program (exercise program management) application; exercise design steps application; major accomplishments in designing and implementing an exercise; purpose and application of various exercise documents; tabletop, functional, and full-scale exercises; exercise design applications for tabletop, functional, and full-scale exercises

L105 Public Information and Warning, June 17 – 19, 2020 at Ohio EMA

This course introduces participants to what the Public Information Officer (PIO) does in emergency management, along with basic information about the Integrated Public Alert and Warning System (IPAWS). The PIO topics covered include the role of the PIO; communication tools and resources encompassing social media; effective communication; preparing the community through outreach and other means; and communication in an incident. The IPAWS topics covered include, what the system is and what it does, preparing alert and warning messages, and writing common alerting protocol messages. This is a two-day classroom course that gives participants time to perform activities and exercises.
